A super easy-and-fun song to introduce kindergarten students to music for the first time.

1. Cows in the Kitchen


It's your first day of a kindergarten music class, and one thing you'll want to do is sing a song, but how do you get them listening, engaged and attentive? How could this progress to learning some first instruments?

This is a fun lesson idea based on a well-known folk song called *Cows in the Kitchen*. Within a few minutes we'll show you how to get children singing then playing in just a few easy steps. This is laying the solid groundwork for any grade!

Children start with learning to play a beat in time to the music, then they learn the story and words of the song within a few minutes.

After watching these next few video steps, students will know the steps to be able to play the castanets or tambourines in time with the music.

2. Echo rhythm game


Just about every teacher has at one time or another clapped a rhythm and had the class echo it to get their class's attention.

But while most teachers know this to be a standard attention grabber, music teachers can extend this simple habit into an AMAZINGLY effective way of getting students to listen better!

And when children learn to listen better it helps them to better understand differences in things like volume, rhythm, tempo and, with practice, onto pitch. In music, this area is often called AURAL training, which is part of the SKILLS section of the curriculum.

In this video, we show you how to make this music idea work and even give you a sample lesson presentation to use with your students, so you can see it work in your classes too!

How singing quickly moves into playing using simple rhythms, instruments and body percussion!

3. Moving from singing to untuned percussion

What does it take to get your students confidently PLAYING music together in the classroom with success?

Children really enjoy and respond well to playing LOTS of different instruments and parts.

However, without the right resources, it can all get very COMPLICATED and NOISY very quickly - especially when playing instrument such as drums, tambourines, castanets and triangles in the classroom all at the same time.

That's why in these videos, each playing experience gets broken down into smaller steps to learn ONE concept at a time.

By learning ONE thing at a time together as a class, the children will quickly learn and remember the:
ONE new part,
the ONE new rhythm,
or the ONE new playing technique!

And over time, all of these smaller strategies stack up upon each other make it possible to play more complicated songs and build their musicianship and skills.

Begin with the singing and press the next page button (you'll find it at the right bottom of each screen) to quickly move towards playing this fun African folk song using two small and simple classroom instruments and this series of simple steps inside our <u>Grade One Fun Music Company curriculum</u> program.

4. Two note tuned percussion piece


Tuned percussion. Most schools have a collection of dusty xylophones somewhere in a cupboard that don't get used anywhere near enough!

However, the truth is that tuned percussion works! It's easy, fun and students can participate and play tunes immediately within their first lesson!

This activity is designed to use just two notes, so children can pick it up easily and quickly. You can use any tuned percussion instrument, keyboards or Boomwhacker pitched percussion tubes.

This video is a series of simple steps inside our <u>Grade Two</u> <u>Fun Music Company curriculum</u> program. It shows you how to confidently teach playing a fun, catchy song from Israel.

It uses just two notes on various tuned instruments such as the Boomwhackers, the chime bars and the xylophones.



Because it is only two notes, children can learn first using body percussion. They will then transfer the patterns they have learned to the instruments. This is all demonstrated on video, and students will participate while they watch the videos.

5. Soundscaping composition

If you're needing to teach music composition to early years classes, these two videos could really help!

A lot of people would say teaching composition when young children can barely even read music or play a note is difficult, if not impossible!

The truth is - most teachers aren't trained in the area of composition and most teachers aren't composers!

6. Directed listening activity

And that's exactly what we provide for you in this area of the curriculum we call **CONNECT**.


CONNECT lessons consist of a short video where we introduce the core topic. Then students listen to the
