Right now I am writing to you from beneath the Parachute Shield, a circular formation that hangs from the ceiling like a delicate umbrella. We saw a big-eared bat and some cave crickets, too!

Here's an easy way to remember which is which ... stalactites have a C for ceiling!

Stalagmites have a 6 for ground!

Compared to the hot, dry air above, these cool caves are like

being on the inside of an air conditioner. But it's time to leave this magical place because Craybella is jangling her climbing gear at me. That can only mean one thing ...

**5:00 p.m.** — What a trek, Meow! After cruising thousands of feet up a scenic road and looking out over a sea of sagebrush on the desert flats below, we arrived at the base of Wheeler Peak, the highest mountain in

the Snake Range. Craybella led the way as we continued our journey on foot, the air growing thinner and colder as we rose above the clouds—yes, I was walking on a cloud! When we reached the summit at 13,065 feet (3,982 meters) above sea level, I perched on a ledge and surveyed the astonishing landscape of valleys, forests, and the Wheeler Cirque Glacier, the last glacier in the state. With the cold wind ruffling my fur, I puffed out my chest and felt like the king of the world!



The caves in Great **Basin National** Park are home to several species that only exist in these caves. Life forms that spend their entire life cycle in caves are called troglobites and include cave crickets, cave springtails, harvestman spiders, and the Great Basin Pseudoscorpion. This cool "false scorpion" doesn't have a stinging tail. Troglobites are able to thrive in dark cave environments due to their unique traits such as the absence of eyes, loss of pigment, and longer appendages. These characteristics help them navigate and thrive in environments where light is limited and touch is crucial for survival.





## The Animals of Nevada



#### BLACK-TAILED JACKRABBIT

Here's something surprising about the Black-Tailed Jackrabbit: it isn't a rabbit at all! The Black-Tailed Jackrabbit is actually a hare. And it's FAST—it can reach speeds of over 30 MPH when frightened.

Fun Fact: Unlike baby rabbits, which stay in their nest for a few weeks, baby Black-Tailed Jackrabbits are on the go when they're only a few days old.

#### DESERT BIGHORN SHEEP

The Desert Bighorn Sheep is the state mammal of Nevada and feels right at home on mountainous terrain. As you might guess from their name, Desert Bighorn

> Sheep have horns, which can be very heavy! Both male and female Desert **Bighorn** Sheep have horns.

#### **BOBCAT**

Bobcats are named for their short "bobbed" tails. These wild felines love the varied terrain of Nevada and are attracted to rocky areas as well as grasslands and

> forests. They are mostly nocturnal, which means that they are most active at night.

#### **SPEAKING**

#### **WRITING**

A lune poem is a three-line poem that is a simple observation. It is formed like this:

Title/Topic

Line 1: 3 words

Line 2: 5 words

Line 3: 3 words

*Lune* means *moon*. The poem is called a lune because the shape of the finished poem is like a moon.
