## Labor Day: More Than Just a Long Weekend

Every year on the first Monday in September, Americans celebrate Labor Day. For many people, the holiday means the end of summer, backyard barbecues, and an extra day off from school or work. But the history of Labor Day is much more than a chance to relax—it's about recognizing the hard work of everyday people.

In the late 1800s, many workers in the United States worked long hours in unsafe conditions. Factories, mines, and railroads were often dangerous, and workers had little protection. People sometimes worked 12 hours a day, 6 or 7 days a week, for very low pay. Children also worked in factories, missing out on school and facing the same risks as adults.

Workers began to organize themselves into labor unions—groups that fought for better wages, shorter hours, and safer workplaces. They held strikes and marches to demand change. One of these events, the Pullman Strike of 1894, turned violent and caught the nation's attention. Soon after, President Grover Cleveland signed a law making Labor Day a national holiday to honor the contributions of workers.

Today, many workers enjoy safer conditions, fair pay, and reasonable hours—thanks in part to the efforts of those early labor unions. Labor Day is a reminder to appreciate the people who keep our communities running, from teachers and nurses to delivery drivers and construction workers. While the holiday is often seen as a celebration of the end of summer, it's also a time to remember the struggles and victories of the labor movement.
