DAY 2 — THE SONORAN DESERT

So there I was, lounging on a butte, just having my morning bath and tuna niblets like any normal cat, when I heard a whoosh right over my head. There it was again!

It was Stefano. AND HE HAD WINGS.

Because he was hang gliding right over Sedona! What's a Sedona? It's not a what, but a where—and it's this intriguing town we arrived in late last night. Nestled in the Verde Valley, Sedona is surrounded by red rock country ... and I mean red rocks that just rise up out of nowhere like FWOOMP! But anyway, back to the hang gliding. I couldn't let Stefano explore the skies alone, so I geared up, got a good running start, and ...

Whoooooosh!

I had wings, too, Meow! How amazing to be part of that blue sky, looking down at those red sandstone rocks rising like ancient watchtowers over the town. Stefano and I swooped and soared over spectacular landforms like Bell Rock and the majestic Cathedral Rock. We whooshed to the top of a butte and sailed down the other side, counting the layers of sediment left by an ancient sea as we soared past. I even came nose-to-beak with a curious cactus wren, Arizona's state bird!

From our bird's-eye view, we could see the valley reach all the way to the distant Mogollon Rim in the north, where the Colorado Plateau drops down to the White Mountains and then down again

to the golden Sonoran Desert. The air was filled with the scent of juniper and creosote, which Stefano explained was part of the chaparral, a unique habitat I'd never encountered before. Looking down, I saw that the chaparral was a shrubby biome thick with tough plants like scrub oak, manzanita, and sagebrush. As we swooped down for a closer look, we startled some

jackrabbits right out of the shrubs! I guess they've never seen flying cats and crayfish before. (I promise I only chased them a little bit.)



Arizona is the only state in the U.S. that contains all four of North America's desert regions. Each desert has its own environment, flora, and fauna.

Northwest: Mojave Desert. This is the driest desert. It's known for its dunes and Joshua trees.

Northeast: Great Basin Desert. This is the highest and coldest desert. Most of its precipitation is in the form of snow.

Southwest/Central: Sonoran Desert.

This is the hottest desert. It's the only place in the world where saguaro cacti grow.

Southeast: Chihauhaun Desert.

This is the wettest and most biodiverse desert. It is home to over 3,000 plant species, 1,000 of which are endemic.
